Spark Broadspeed Mini

Unless you're an ardent fan of the BMC Mini range I'm sure that there are not many people who have even heard of the name Ralph Broad.

In the early 60's he was one of the pioneers of super-tuning the Mini 850, and Mini Coopers under the name of 'Broadspeed'. He also had several successes on the race track.

In my opinion, one of his finest moments was when he designed the 'Broadspeed' Mini. Basically it's the standard Mini body shell, with what I think is a most pretty GT type roof and back blended to the rear of the car. I like the term 'blended' because that's just what it is. It doesn't look like an after-thought. If you ordered one, you could choose your own specifications, according to your budget.

Spark make a really nice model of this car. Despite the attention to detail, I feel that the roof line is too high. The actual car was 5" (125mm) lower. The A pillar was raked at 20 deg. And again this seems too steep. But, this is nit-picking.

Otherwise it really is a super little model. When one sees the model, you realise how small it really is. The paintwork is superb, with a nice high gloss – and photo-etching – how do they do it?

The interior detail – although difficult to see, is also correct. One last bit of nit-picking. I think the windscreen wipers should be silver.

On the other hand, if this is a model of the actual car, they may be correct, as are the small vents behind the front wheel arch. The picture I have of the car doesn't have these vents. The door handles, sliding windows, petrol filler cap are all there, and very nicely done.

I could go on forever, as this car is really one of my all-time favourites. Very highly recommended by me.

Another favourite of mine is the Spark Marcos, a really neat looking little model. Now, all Spark have to do is make the Mini Ogle.

Auction News - from June 2010 Die-Cast Collector.

Matchbox Models of Yesteryear returned excellent prices with some record values recorded from the first part of Horace Dunkley's sale at Vectis recently.

The sale, over two days in March, featured some 1650 lots which resulted in a total of more than £115,000. A record price was paid for a Y4-4 Duesenberg, Model J Town Car and, with the buyer's commission and VAT added, the final figure fetched was £5,045.

There were, of course, a number of other models being purchased for four figure sums but there was something for everyone as there were also many models selling for less than £30.

Some of the models fetching four-figure sums were rather surprising, such as a Duesenberg Model J Town Car in red with some chassis variations from the normal models, which sold for £3,245 after a top estimate of just £50. A similar situation arose with the same model which had light brown seats and an unusual dark green roof; it made £1,680 (estimate £80). Another example was a 1906 Silver Ghost (Y10-3) with a silver chassis, unboxed, with a top estimate of £260, it realised £1,920.

Out of 22 lots featuring the 1938 Lagonda Drophead Coupe (Y11-13), two of them sold for £1,320 after being offered with estimates of £220 and £140; the first with green seats, grill and trunk, while the other featured a gloss black chassis and solid chrome wheels. A rare Lagonda, that was for sale was in gold with a purple chassis, the textured luggage trunk version. With a top estimate of £1,200, it realised £1,920.

Many of the other models with established high values sold very well including the purple-bodied 1910 Benz Limousine (Y3-2) realising £3,360 (estimate £2,200) and an AEC type Y Lorry with the 'Osram Lamps' logo in duck egg blue with the silver radiator edging which sold for £2,040, doubling its estimate.

Mr Dunkley attended the sale on both days, where he gave a number of television interviews and signed copies of the hardback version of the sale catalogue. I must recommend this catalogue to anyone who is interested in the Models of Yesteryears range, as it is a great guide to the many variations of these fine models.

I understand they are still available from Vectis; the hardback copy is priced at £70, and the normal paperback version is priced at £20, and both are certainly a fine investment.

The second part of the Horace Dunkley collection containing the Matchbox Dinky Code 1 and Code 2 versions, will be offered for sale later in the year.
